Anita Hill, a renowned social justice activist, and the woman who made sexual harassment in the workplace a national issue by testifying against Supreme Court Justice nominee Clarence Thomas, will speak on February 24,2017 at 7:30 p.m. at William Paterson University in Wayne as part of the 38<sup>th</sup> season of the Distinguished Lecturer Series. Ms. Hill will speak about "Reimagining Equality: Inclusive Communities in Post-Obama America" examining how to address questions of equity,

including sexual harassment and assault, gender and racial economic gaps, and leadership disparities.

Ms. Hill began her career as a lawyer in Washington after graduating from Yale Law School as one of few black students in a class of 160. Her efforts led to national recognition of sexual harassment issues in the workplace.

# **2016 Investment Returns for Public-Employee Pension Up 7%, Much Better Than in 2015**<a href="MISpotlight.com">MISpotlight.com</a>

The board that oversees New Jersey's beleaguered public-employee pension system received some good news yesterday as new figures showed overall investment returns finished ahead by about 7 percent last year. New Jersey's pension system - which 785,000 current and retired workers rely on to cover their retirements - is currently underfunded by an estimated \$44 billion, according to the state's calculations, and much more by some other estimates. The pension system was also ranked as the worst-funded state pension fund in the United States by Bloomberg, falling below both those of Kentucky and Illinois.

To help address the funding problem, Governor Chris Christie recently enacted a bipartisan bill that will require the state to begin making its employer pension contributions on a quarterly basis instead of all at once at the end of the fiscal year, which is the current practice. That change, set to begin in the 2017 fiscal year, should help generate better long-term investment returns by getting more money into the system earlier in the fiscal year since full years with negative returns are generally rare.

In all, the pension system saw returns totaling 7.09 percent in 2016, up from 0.64 percent measured the year before, according to the figures released during yesterday's meeting. The turnaround was even more impressive compared to the 2016 fiscal year returns, which came in 0.93 percent in the net

That, combined with increasing enrollment at the school, which reached 21,000 students this year, prompted Montclair State to switch its commencement schedule this year from a one-ceremony event, to a three-ceremony plan - including one in January.

#### **Rutgers Advocacy Effort Calls for Bridge Act**

Students at Rutgers University have sent more than 6,000 letters to their U.S. senators and representatives in support of a bill that would provide "provisional protected presence" and employment authorization to young immigrants who were brought to the U.S. illegally as children. The students sent the letters through a Rutgers portal in response to a "call to action" from President Robert Barchi alerting students of an opportunity to advocate for the BRIDGE Act, which would provide temporary legal status to beneficiaries of former President Obama's Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program in the event President Trump overturns it via an executive order.

One promise from Trump was a \$20 billion grant program, although how that would work has never been detailed.

A massive grant program to further expand charters or even bring back private-school vouchers could force the state to move in some novel directions that will bring a very pro-charter sensibility to the federal Department of Education.

### Open for Business: \$63M Hall Opens at Rowan

Rowan University's William G. Rohrer College of Business has a new Business Hall - a four-story, 98,000-square-foot facility costing \$63.2 million. The building was partly funded by New Jersey's Building Our Future Bond Act passed by voters in 2012. Rowan received \$117 million in the referendum, with \$46 million funding Business Hall and another \$46 million funding from the \$70.6 million Engineering Building.

### Major Building Projects at NJ Colleges to Benefit from \$34M Allocation

It's been more than four years since voters authorized a major bond issue to help pay for new buildings and renovations at New Jersey colleges and universities. Now, lawmakers are taking steps to allocate \$34 million, which represents the remaining dollars that have yet to be spent from that bond issue. Committees in both the Assembly and Senate voted last week to approve a list of projects that will use up what remains of the \$750 million "Building Our Future Bond Act" from 2012. Much of the money that has yet to be spent will go to two-year colleges to pay for new academic buildings, according to the list of projects - which won bipartisan support.

# **Rowan to Debut \$134.2 Million in New Additions, Facilities as Rapid Growth Continues** BizJournals.com

The new \$63.2 million home of Rowan University's William G. Rohrer College of Business will officially open its doors on Wednesday, January 18, 2017, marking the completion of yet another large-scale project that's rapidly changing the face of the Glassboro university. The total \$63.2 million cost of the project was partially covered by the state's Building Our Future Bond Act, approved by voters via referendum four years ago. The act allows state officials to borrow a total of \$750 million to fund upgrades and additions at New Jersey's institutes of higher education.

It's the first academic building on the university's campus to focus solely on business programs. It will house 14 classrooms, 70 faculty offices, 15 administrative offices, seven conference rooms and 10 specialty spaces like a trading room. A \$10 million gift from the William G. Rohrer Charitable Foundation was given to the school in 2004 to build out of its business programs, which now includes a MBA program, a Master of Science in finance, a dual MBA and Doctor of Osteopath degree, as well as eight undergraduate programs.

Montclair State University President Susan A. Cole <u>delivered the keynote address</u> on January 13 at The YMCA of Newark and Vicinity's 46<sup>th</sup> annual Memorial Breakfast Honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The first organization to recognize the civil rights leader with an annual event, a tradition that began in 1971, the YMCA welcomed the president of New Jersey's second-largest higher education institution as part of the morning event.

"In the room this morning are gathered many of the people who care deeply about the future of this city and its people, and we are gathering at a moment in time when the nation's first black presidency is coming to a close, and when, both as a state and as a nation, we appear to be a bit confused about who we are as a people, and we appear to have lost a sense of certainty about how to find the road to a better future," said Dr. Cole to the crowd of local leaders and community members. "As I think of Dr. King and what he achieved and where we are now, I find myself thinking of something that Eleanor Roosevelt said. She said, 'We should rejoice in the accomplishments of those before us, be

proud of the heritage that we inherit, but be always vigilant that the future is ours alone to make.' The future is ours alone to make."

## **Guadagno Joins GOP Governor's Race, Ciattarelli Says Cancer Will Slow Him** NJSpotlight.com

Two major developments Thursday reshaped this year's GOP gubernatorial primary: Lt. Gov. Kim Guadagno filed the necessary paperwork to officially join the race and Assemblyman Jack Ciattarelli announced that his own campaign activities will slow down this month while he receives treatment for cancer.

Lt. Gov. Guadagno was long considered to be eyeing a run for governor, especially after joining a nonprofit "think tank" last year that many viewed as a precursor to a 2017 campaign. Paperwork filed with the New Jersey Election Law Commission yesterday made her candidacy official. Asm. Ciattarelli revealed that he recently had surgery for cancer and is undergoing radiation treatment after being diagnosed with cancer affecting his tonsils and throat. Mr. Ciattarelli (R-Somerset) said he's confident his prognosis is a good one because treatment for oropharyngeal cancer has a 90 percent success rate. His radiation treatments will last through the end of the month.

# Gov. Cuomo's Free Tuition Plan Won't Help New York's State of Mind Hechingerreport.org

Cuomo has proposed to offer free tuition at any State University of New York (SUNY) community college or four-year campus. While this latest incarnation of a free-college plan adds a component that is a step in the right direction - an income cap that would limit the funds to students from a family income of \$100,000 this year, ultimately rising to \$125,000 - it is still likely to focus much of its benefits on subsidizing students who would be attending college otherwise. Cuomo's proposal would provide no additional benefits to these students, as his proposal covers tuition alone, not other aspects of the cost of attending college, such as residence hall and dining hall fees, and transportation costs. Instead, the bulk of the funds would go to students from families who make well above the median income, who currently receive less grant aid.

### New Jersey University Has State Immunity, U.S. Court Rules

Montclair State University is an arm of the State of New Jersey and is therefore immune from a former employee's employment discrimination lawsuit, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit ruled Tuesday.

The <u>40-page decision</u> by the three-judge appeals panel - which overturned a lower court's ruling declaring that Montclair State could be sued by Paula Maliandi, a former media relations officer - engaged in an extensive three-part test of the ways in which the university does, and does not, qualify as a state entity. The court determined that Montclair State is financially *not* an arm of the state because it derives more funding from alternative sources than from the state and because the state is now awarded to pay financial judgments against the institution. But because the university can't sue and be sued in its own name, is immune from state taxes, and (as a member of the state college system) is not governed autonomously, the court concluded that on balance, the university is an arm of the state.

### Montclair University Found Immune From Suit as Arm of State

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit has ruled that Montclair State University is an arm of the State of New Jersey, and therefore immune under the  $11^{th}$  Amendment from liability for an employee's discrimination suit. The decision reverses a ruling holding the university subject to Paula Mailandi's suit in federal court for claims under the Family and Medical Leave Act and under state law after she took leave for treatment of breast cancer and was offered only an inferior position upon her return. The level of state control over Montclair is not as extensive as was found in *University of Iowa in Bowers v. National Collegiate Athletic Association* but "constrained enough" to tip the scale in favor of immunity, the court said.
