Methodology

Penn, Schoen and Berland Associates, LLC, conducted online interviews from September 30 to October 5, 2009 among 671 likely 2009 Gubernatorial election voters in New Jersey. The margin of error for the entire sample is +/- 3.78 at the 95% confidence level.

Note: All numbers cited represent percentages (%). Some percentages add to more or less than 100% due to rounding error.
